Eric Gale writes:

"I was most interested to read Colin Hedger's 'Life and Times', which corresponded with my own. I remember Tommy Seed, the Headmaster of the Esher CoE School, who ruled us with a rod of iron (and willow canes!). I can see him now, sitting in the classroom making willow shopping baskets, which he used to sell to the local shops. We would gather the willow from the woods on our afternoon nature walks. I remember the first ever Whitbread Gold Cup in 1949, "Much Obliged" won. He beat the hot favourite "The Mandarin", a grey. I backed the winner and persuaded my father to have a £1 win at 16/1. My father used to employ me on race days, as well as local people, including my old Headmaster, Tommy Seed. My two favourite jobs were the photo finish, when called I would stand below the photo camera box in the Members Enclosure and wait for about 7-10 minutes while they developed the finish photo. It would be lowered down to me in a basket and I would run down to the judge waiting in his box. I also stood by the Royal Box when Royalty was coming and when the royal foot touched the ground I would hoist the Royal Standard. On one occasion Winston Churchill was sitting there. I look forward to the reunion".
